Activities and Deliverables may include but are not limited to the following:

Minimum Control Measure # 1 (Public Education and Outreach):

Prepare and conduct a public education and outreach program including the preparation and distribution of brochures, videos, refrigerator magnets, presentations to community and/or stakeholder organizations and/or schools, targeted electronic mailings, use of portable displays, training sessions, press conferences, press releases and/or letters to the editor, informational meetings, and articles for publication, an informational website, social media postings, promotional give-aways and coastal interpretive signage.

Minimum Control Measure # 2 (Public Involvement and Education):

Conduct public meetings for members of the public and stakeholders at critical junctures on major projects, develop and maintain e-mailing and postal mailing lists to keep the public appraised and involved in projects undertaken by the COMMITTEE, assist in beach cleanups and wetland plantings to the extent possible, conduct citizen science water monitoring programs, conduct attitude and awareness surveys as appropriate, maintain and foster inter-relationships with community organizations, business organizations, recreation organizations, educational institutions, environmental organizations and various levels of government.

Minimum Control Measure # 3 (Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination):

Conduct water quality monitoring to detect unexpected changes in water quality, record and report observations of identified or suspected illicit discharges to appropriate agencies, assist in and help coordinate responses to identified or suspected illicit discharges, and assist in the maintenance and updating of the county's storm drain GIS mapping system.

Minimum Control Measure # 4 (Construction Site Stormwater Runoff Control):

Assist member municipalities in identifying available construction site stormwater runoff control measures, requirements and procedures, and report any observed instances of stormwater runoff from construction sites to the member municipality and/or appropriate agency or agencies; assist in organizing training courses in erosion and sediment control; conduct water quality monitoring to assist in the detection of unusual discharges or conditions that might indicate inadequate erosion and sediment control from construction sites.

Minimum Control Measure # 5 (Post Construction Stormwater Management):

Assist member municipalities in identifying available post construction stormwater management control measures, requirements and procedures, and report any observed instances of post construction stormwater runoff to the member municipality and/or appropriate agency or agencies; assist in organizing training courses in erosion and sediment control; conduct water quality monitoring to assist in the detection of unusual discharges or conditions that might indicate inadequate erosion and sediment control from construction sites.

Minimum Control Measure # 6 (Pollution Prevention / Good Housekeeping):

Assist member municipalities in identifying available pollution prevention / good housekeeping practices including but not limited to information on pet waste management, Canada Goose control, household hazardous waste programs, and recycling programs. Participate in applicable webinars and meetings and report back to member municipalities.

Phase II Activities Undertaken On Behalf of Member Municipalities March 10, 2019 to March 9, 2020 Permit Year

MCM # 1 - Public Education and Outreach

- Staffed information booths at three events: the Port Washington Chamber of Commerce's HarborFest on June 2, 2019; the North Shore Kiwanis Club's Sea Cliff Mini Mart on October 6, 2019; and National Estuaries Day at Theodore Roosevelt Park in Oyster Bay. Total attendees estimated at 15,000.
- Led senior citizens on two environmental tours along Hempstead Harbor shoreline at North Hempstead Beach Park on July 15, 2019 and August 12, 2019.
- Worked with Rep. Thomas Suozzi, the Port Washington-Manhasset Office
 of Emergency Management, the Manhasset Bay Protection Committee,
 and Save the Sound to plan press conference and public meeting with the
 Army Corps of Engineers on proposed storm surge barriers for elected
 officials and others which were held on October 24, 2019 in Great Neck.
- Attended three press conferences: one on July 29, 2019 at Laurel Hollow Beach to promote shellfish gardens as a means to mitigate stormwater pollutants; one on August 2, 2019 with Save the Sound and Rep. Thomas Suozzi to report on beach water quality; and one on February 28, 2020 with Citizens Campaign for the Environment to celebrate and promote the implementation of New York State's single use plastic bag ban.
- Continued participation with the Manhasset Bay Protection Committee, Oyster Bay Cold Spring Harbor Protection Committee, Town of Oyster Bay, the Coalition to Save Hempstead Harbor and Friends of the Bay in C.E.S.S.P.O.O.L. grant to raise public awareness of impact of onsite waste treatment systems. (C.E.S.S.P.O.O.L. = Coordinated Environmental Solutions to Septic Problems Occurring On Long Island). This included distributing a series of fact sheets to homeowners and maintaining a website and Facebook page.
- Organized a boat tour of Hempstead Harbor for elected officials scheduled for September 6, 2019. Unfortunately, it had to be cancelled due to severe weather.
- Promoted a "Scoop the Poop Long Island" Facebook page to educate the public on pet waste issues.

- HHPC's Executive Director helped organize the Long Island Envirothon which was held on April 30, 201 at the Old Bethpage Village Restoration in Old Bethpage.
- Maintained and updated the Hempstead Harbor website: (<u>www.HempsteadHarbor.org</u>) including its blog page.
- Published 3 articles in the Sea Cliff Village Bulletin: one on July 17, 2019 on 1-4, dioxane; one on October 8, 2019 on PFAS; and one on January 20, 2020 on grants for nitrogen-reducing septic systems.
- Published a blog article on July 22, 2019 on emerging contaminants.
- Copied and distributed 27 articles and editorials in weekly and daily papers to municipal representatives and others on water quality issues.
- Participated with the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation District in the distribution of two professional videos (one 30 minutes and one 5 minutes) entitled Stormwater Pollution and Green Infrastructure Solutions along with an accompanying brochure.
- Maintained and updated a Facebook site with relevant articles on water quality.
- Updated and distributed a list of media outlets.
- Monitored Nassau County sewage spill reports for the Glen Cove Wastewater Treatment Facility and posted information on Facebook and e-mailed to Committee members and others.
- Distributed brochures on shellfishing in Hempstead Harbor.
- Distributed brochures on understanding beach closures and on the problems associated with feeding of wildfowl.
- Posted water quality monitoring results for Hempstead Harbor on website and Facebook.
- Published and distributed an Annual Water Quality Report on water quality in Hempstead Harbor in hard copy and disk formats and posted it on a website.
- Participated in a lobby day in Albany to promote the NYS Environmental Protection Fund and to educate state legislators on the need to fund stormwater efforts.

- Participated in the Army Corps of Engineers public meeting on proposed storm surge barriers on October 24, 2019 at the US Merchant Marine Academy and relayed a summary to HHPC municipalities and others.
- Attended Long Island Nitrogen Action Plan (LINAP) Fertilizer Workgroup meetings on April 12, 2019 and relayed summaries to HHPC municipalities and others.
- Attending a meeting on March 21, 2020 to assist the Long Island Nitrogen Action Plan (LINAP) with coordinating a meeting with Protection Committees.
- Attended a meeting with DEC Water Division representatives in Riverhead on October 3, 2018 to discuss the status of Shellfish Pathogen TMDLs and relayed summaries to HHPC municipalities.
- Organized and conducted a Coordinated Harbor Cleanup with the Towns of North Hempstead, Oyster Bay and the City of Glen Cove on April 15, 2019 and began organizing a second one for 2020.
- Attended a Fertilizer Roundtable discussion at Farmingdale State College on May 29, 2018 and relayed a summary to HHPC municipalities and others.
- Gave a joint presentation with the Manhasset Bay Protection Committee to the Port Washington League of Women Voters on ways to protect our local waterways on November 17, 2019.
- Attended a seminar entitled "Turning the Tide" at Stony Brook University on nitrogen-reduction efforts and relayed summaries to HHPC member municipalities.
- Attended NYS DEC and LINAP meeting on July 19, 2019 on its LIQWIDS Data Sharing program and relayed information to member municipalities.
- Attended the annual Water We Going to Do conference in Hauppauge on November 19, 2019 and prepared a summary which was shared with member municipalities and others.
- HHPC's Executive Director began pursuing an Environmental Sustainability Certificate at Hofstra University in conjunction with the Governor's Office of Storm Recovery. He attended two courses – one on June 25, 2019 on native plants and one on September 24, 2019 on coastal wetland ecology and relayed summaries of the courses to municipal members and others.
- Attended an environmental roundtable with NYS DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos on March 6, 2020 in Melville to provide guidance on the proposed

Restore Mother Nature \$3 Billion state environmental bond act and relayed suggestions to member municipalities and others.

Revised and distributed HHPC's member list.

MCM #2 - Public Participation

- Held eight HHPC meetings (open to the public). These were held on March 13, 2019, April 10, 2019, May 16, 2019 (Joint Protection Committee meeting), June 5, 2019, September 11, 2019, October 16, 2019, November 13, 2019, and January 8, 2020.
- Helped organize a tour (open to the public) of an innovative wetlandsbased septic system on May 16, 2019 at The Nature Conservancy's Uplands Farm headquarters in Cold Spring Harbor.
- Conducted a citizen's science water monitoring program with local citizen's group (Coalition to Save Hempstead Harbor) and volunteers. This consisted of a weekly program during the summer for 24 weeks and a biweekly program during the winter for another 24 weeks.
- HHPC's Executive Director was selected to serve on a consortium with universities and others to help plan the use of the Town of Hempstead's restored Shellfish Laboratory. It's use is intended to provide a means for students to conduct research on shellfish pathogens, Bioextraction, etc.
- Continued networking with local citizens groups (Coalition to Save Hempstead Harbor, Glenwood / Glen Head Civic Association, North Shore Land Alliance, and United Civic Council of Glen Head and Glenwood Landing).
- Continued to provide representation to the Long Island Sound Study
 Citizens Advisory Committee, the Nassau County Soil and Water
 Conservation District, the Long Island Nitrogen Action Plan Advisory
 Committee, the LINAP Fertilizer Workgroup, the NYS DEC TMDL
 Workgroup, the NYS DEC MS4 Workgroup, the NYS DEC Dredge
 Material Subcommittee, and the New York Marine Sciences Consortium.
- Continued to provide advice, as requested to the Town of North
 Hempstead in the development of a Blueway Trail from Little Neck Bay to
 Hempstead Harbor and to the Town of Oyster Bay in its development of a
 Blueway trail from Hempstead Harbor to Oyster Bay and Cold Spring
 Harbor.
- Promoted area beach cleanups and invasive removal projects.

- Assisted with the planning and conducting of a volunteer removal of invasive plants and planting of native plants, trees, shrubs and other plants at Nassau County's historic Cedarmere site.
- Partnered with the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Friends of Cedarmere along with volunteers to maintain the rain gardens installed at Cedarmere in Roslyn Harbor.
- Continued to work with the Long Island Sound Study Citizens Advisory
 Committee to educate Congressional representatives about water quality
 improvements and the need for additional federal funding. This effort
 resulted in a record level of federal funding for Long Island Sound
 environmental programs in FY 2020. Many of the projects funded include
 public participation.
- Assisted the Nassau County Executive's office with the implementation of a grant program for homeowners for nitrogen-reducing septic systems.

MCM # 3 – Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination

- Tested water quality weekly from May to October and biweekly at selected locations between November and April and checked results to see if any unusual readings or trends occurred which might indicate illicit discharges.
- Continued to monitor unidentified discharges in Glen Cove Creek and continued to work with various agencies to try to determine their origin.
- Continued to implement a multi-year C.E.S.S.P.O.O.L. public education program to raise awareness about the impact of discharges from onsite septic systems and the need to conduct regular maintenance. Proper maintenance of septic systems may reduce the incentive for homeowners and others to install illicit discharges to handle overflows.
- Assisted the City of Glen Cove with identifying remedial measures to mitigate sources of contamination to Crescent Beach.

MCM # 4 – Construction Site Runoff Control

- Assisted the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation District in planning and holding two NYS DEC certification and training sessions for municipal officials and contractors in sediment and erosion control on August 13, 2019 and on December 10, 2019. A total of 164 persons were trained and certified.
- Monitored changes in regulations and advised member municipalities as necessary. HHPC's Executive Director served as the official NYS DEC representative for all of Long Island's MS4 Operators to participate in discussions regarding revised MS4 Stormwater permit.

 Observed for unusual discharges or conditions while conducting weekly water quality monitoring (late spring to fall) that might indicate inadequate erosion and sediment control from construction sites.

MC # 5 – Post Construction Runoff Control

- Assisted the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation District in planning and holding two NYS DEC certification and training sessions for municipal officials and contractors in sediment and erosion control on August 13, 2019 and on December 10, 2019. A total of 164 persons were trained and certified.
- Monitored changes in regulations and advised member municipalities as necessary. HHPC's Executive Director served as the official NYS DEC representative for all of Long Island's MS4 Operators to participate in discussions regarding revised MS4 Stormwater permit.
- Observed for unusual discharges or conditions while conducting weekly water quality monitoring (late spring to fall) that might indicate inadequate erosion and sediment control from construction sites.

MCM # 6 - Good Housekeeping

- Assisted the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation District in planning and holding two NYS DEC certification and training sessions for municipal officials and contractors in sediment and erosion control on August 13, 2019 and on December 10, 2019. A total of 164 persons were trained and certified.
- Worked with the Town of Oyster Bay on a successful grant application to replace the septic systems at Tappen Beach with innovative nitrogenreducing technologies.
- Worked with the Town of Oyster Bay to incorporate nitrogen and bacteria filtration devices in 37 catch basins in the Powerhouse Drain subwatershed as part of a highway improvement project. This contract was awarded in early 2019, new storm drains were installed in the fall f 2019 and the storm drain filtration devices began being fabricated in March of 2019.
- Participated with the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation District in the distribution of two professional videos (one 30 minutes and one 5 minutes) entitled Stormwater Pollution and Green Infrastructure Solutions along with an accompanying brochure.
- Assisted the Long Island Native Plant Initiative with offering low cost native plants to municipalities and residents.

- Continued to work with the Town of Oyster Bay, the Village of Sea Cliff and the City of Glen Cove to maintain pet waste stations provided by HHPC.
- Coordinated a successful effort to obtain state funds in the FY 2020 budget for one or more additional shellfish pathogen laboratories on Long Island. This will allow for more bacteria testing and more accurate pathogen TMDLs.
- Assisted with the planning and removal of invasive plants at Scudder's Pond in Sea Cliff. This will help the native plants that were installed in 2012 to continue to thrive and provide natural filtration for stormwater pollutants.
- Assisted the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation District with providing funding to local governments and not-for-profit organizations for conservation and water-quality projects.

 Continued to serve as a member of the Long Island Nitrogen Action Plan's Nassau County Subwatershed Planning Advisory Workgroup.
